In 2008 she founded China Africa Bridge (CAB), an organization that

Hafsat Abiola-Costello received the Youth Peace and Justice Award from the Cambridge Peace Commission in 1997, the State of the World Forum's Change Maker Award in 1998, and the World Economic Forum's Global Leader of Tomorrow Award 2000. She is a member of the World Future Council.

Nezha Alaoui M'Hammdi is Senior Fellow at Policy Center for the New South (since 2020) and the current Ambassador of His Majesty the King of Morocco to Ethiopia and Djibouti since 2016. She has served as first Permanent Representative of the Kingdom of Morocco after its return to the African Union by 2017, and to the Peace and Security Council of the AU (April 2018). She is currently Dean of the Council of Arab League Ambassadors to Ethiopia. She also served from 2013 to 2016 as an Ambassador of Morocco to Ghana, Togo and Benin, being the first Moroccan female Ambassador of the Kingdom of Morocco in Africa. After joining the Moroccan Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Morocco in 1989, Mrs. Nezha Alaoui M'Hammdi served mainly in Italy and Ghana. During her assignment, from 2005 to 2009, to the headquarters of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, in Rabat, she was first handling the relations with the European Union Commission, the European Union, mainly the European parliament and the Council of Europe. She was also meanwhile member of the commission which drafted the Advanced Statute negotiated between Morocco and the EU. From to 2009 to 2013, Mrs. Alaoui M'Hammdi was appointed as a Deputy-Director in charge of African Affairs at the Moroccan Foreign Ministry. Mrs. Nezha Alaoui M'hammdi Holds a PhD in International Relations.

A gender expert and women's rights activist of regional and global acclaim, Letty's 22 years of work with the UN has seen her participate in and substantively contribute to several inter-governmental negotiations including the UN General Assembly, the Africa Union Summits, Global Financing for Development and Aid Effectiveness Conferences, Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) and many more. Her passion and commitment to women's rights have seen her leading the establishment of key networks including FemWise (Africa Women Mediators Network), AWLN (Africa Women Leaders Network), AGDEN (Africa Gender and Development Evaluators Network), GIMAC (Gender is my Agenda Campaign), among others. She led the Africa Unite Campaign to end Violence Against Women and Girls (2010-2015) and is currently leading the team developing the Africa Regional Spotlight Initiative on ending Harmful and Traditional Practices and ending child marriage. In her formative career years, Letty served her own country of Zimbabwe working as a Town Planning Officer in Matabeleland South and in Harare.

Special Envoy of the Chairperson of African Union Commission on Women, Peace, and Security

Bineta Diop is currently the Special Envoy of the Chairperson of the African Union Commission on Women, Peace and Security. She is the founder and President of Femmes Africa Solidarité (FAS), an international NGO based in Geneva with its operation office in Dakar/Senegal. The organization seeks to foster, strengthen and promote the leadership role of women in conflict prevention, management and resolution in Africa. Mme Diop played an instrumental role in the adoption of the Solemn Declaration on Gender Equality in Africa as well as the Protocol to the African Charter on Human and People's Rights on the Rights of Women in Africa. She has led peacebuilding programs as well as many women's peace and security initiatives. She was named one of the 100 most influential people in the world by Time Magazine in 2011 and was awarded the Légion d'honneur by the French President in 2012 and was also co-chair of the World Economic Forum on Africa in 2014. Bineta Diop studied International Relations and Diplomacy. She has a Honoris Causa from the United Nations-affiliated University for Peace (UPEACE), Costa Rica and Middlesex University, in United Kingdom.



Birame Diop

Former Army Chief of Staff, Republic of Senegal

Previously Chief of staff of Senegalese Air Forces, General Birame Diop occupies currently the function of Security advisor to the President of the Republic and from January 1st 2020 he will become the Chief of the General staff of the Senegalese Armed Forces. His training courses started with the preparatory classes at the Prytanee military junior school of Saint-Louis in 1974 and Pilot officer training course at the Royal Academy of Morocco in 1985. From 2005 to 2012, he worked at the Central Bank of Morocco where he served as Director of Economics, Statistics and International Relations. He was also in charge of the Research Department and was a member of the cabinet of the Governor. Prior to joining Bank Al-Maghrib, Karim El Aynaoui worked for eight years at the World Bank, as an Economist within the Middle East, North Africa, and Africa regions. He has published books and journal articles on macroeconomic issues in developing countries. She is the head of programs and international relations in FFP. In her work as practitioner she focuses on issues such as self-reflection and reintegration processes of ex-combatants, victims-perpetrators relations and restorative justice and the engagement of "formers" in P/CVE. She further works in the fields of Women, Peace and Security, peace education, media, arms control and disarmament processes. Christina Foerch is a member of the EU-led RAN Radicalisation Awareness Network's expert pool and consults organizations in the MENA region and the EU in the field of engaging formers in P/CVE, reintegration of formers as well as IS-returnees.

Alexis Henshaw is the author of *Why Women Rebel: Understanding Women's Participation in Armed Rebel Groups* (Routledge, 2017) and co-author of *Insurgent Women: Female Combatants in Civil Wars* (Georgetown University Press, 2019). She is currently an assistant professor at Troy University. Her research interests include gender issues in international politics, civil wars, conflict management, and Latin America. She has also published work on research methods and design, including pieces focused on pedagogy, data analysis & visualization, and inclusivity. Her work has appeared in *Journal of Global Security Studies*, *International Feminist Journal of Politics*, *Studies in Conflict & Terrorism*, *Small Wars & Insurgencies*, and a variety

of other peer-reviewed outlets. Dr. Henshaw has written for The Conversation, Duck of Minerva, Political Violence @ a Glance, and The Monkey Cage, the political blog of The Washington Post. She has authored reports for the U.S. Army's Peacekeeping and Stability Operations Institute and the Centre for Women, Peace, and Security at the London School of Economics. She is an associate fellow with the Global Network on Extremism and Technology and has consulted with UN Women, the UN Counterterrorism Executive Directorate, and a variety of other organizations. Dr. Henshaw received her Ph.D. in Political Science from the University of Arizona with a certificate in Gender and Women's Studies and previously taught at Duke University, Miami University, Bucknell University, and Sweet Briar College.

Annika Hilding Norberg

Head of Peace Operations and Peacebuilding, Geneva Center for Security Policy



Ms Annika Hilding Norberg is head of Peace Operations and Peacebuilding at the Geneva Center for Security Policy since 2017. She leads, facilitates and contributes to peace operations and peacebuilding dialogue, policy applicable research and development, and education and training. Annika's focus is on strengthening leadership for peace with an emphasis on UN and EU operations and women leadership in particular. She serves on the Geneva Peacebuilding Platform Management Committee since 2017 and will join the International Leadership Association's Board of Directors on 1 July 2021. Prior to joining the GCSP, Annika was the founder and director of the International Forum for the Challenges of Peace Operations (CF) for 21 years, a joint platform of then 22 countries, incl. the 5 Permanent Members of the UN SC, aimed at strengthening UN peace operations. Originating from when she served as president of the London School of Economics (LSE) International Relations Society, the CF was founded in 1996 as part of Annika's research studies at the LSE on comparative approaches to peace operations. Annika led the CF based at the LSE (1996-2000), Swedish National Defence College (1997-2002) and Folke Bernadotte Academy, an agency of Swedish MFA (2003-2017). She served on the Board of Directors for the Peace Operations Training Institute (2010-2013). Annika holds academic degrees and certificates from the LSE, Free University of Brussels, Moscow State University and Universidad del Pais Vasco. She is main editor of some 80 reports and policy briefs. In 2008, she was awarded the Silver Medal of the Swedish Royal Academy of Military Science for her contributions to strengthening UN peacekeeping.

Paul-Simon Handy

Paul-Simon Handy is currently Senior Regional Advisor after he serving a Head of the Conflict Prevention and Risk Analysis Division of the ISS in Pretoria. Serge Stroobants is the Director of Operations for Europe and the MENA region at the Institute for Economics and Peace. He is a former Colonel in the Belgian Armed Forces with an academic specialization in political sciences, international relations, security and defense, global risk analysis, foresight and crisis management. He holds degrees from the Belgian Royal Military Academy, the Free University of Brussels, Université Jean Moulin Lyon III (France), the German General Staff College and Vesalius College. Associate Professor, Michigan State University

Jakana is Associate Professor in the Department of Political Science at Michigan State University. Her research focuses on political violence with an emphasis on the behavior of violent non-state actors. Her recent projects examine women's participation in rebel, terrorist and community-based violent organizations, how violence influences conflict resolution, the correlates of terrorist lethality and the determinants of successful peace processes. Her work has been published in the *American Journal of Political Science*, *American Political Science Review*, *International Organization*, *Journal of Peace Research*, *Conflict Management and Peace Science* and in *Security Studies*. She received her Ph.D. from Pennsylvania State University in 2012 and B.A. from the University of Maryland, Baltimore County.



Harmonie Toros

Associate Professor, University of Kent

Harmonie Toros' research lies at the crossroad between conflict resolution/conflict transformation, peace studies, and terrorism studies. She has published seminal work developing a critical theory-based approach to terrorism and examining the transformation of conflicts marked by terrorist violence. She has carried out extensive field research in Europe, the Middle East, South East Asia, and Africa researching state and non-state armed groups as well as investigating the human experience of war from combatant and non-combatant perspectives. In 2015, Harmonie was awarded the University's Inaugural Research Prize (Early Career Researchers Category). She is an editor of the journal *Critical Studies on Terrorism* and a member of the International Studies Association (ISA) and British International Studies Association (BISA). She also publishes on pedagogical issues surrounding the teaching of human experience in war, based on her third-year undergraduate *Humans at War* module. The innovative design and delivery of the module was recognized in 2017 by the Political Studies Association with the Sir Bernard Crick Award for Outstanding Teaching and by Kent's Faculty of Social Sciences Teaching Award in 2016. Harmonie joined the School in 2011 after lecturing at the University of Queensland, Australia and the University of Canterbury, New Zealand. She completed her PhD ("Terrorism, Talking and Transformation: Northern Ireland and Mindanao") at the Department of International Politics of Aberystwyth University in 2010. Following a BA in Contemporary History (Sussex) and a Maîtrise in History (Paris IV- Sorbonne).



Dominique Trinquand

Former Head of Mission, French Military Mission to the UN and NATO

General Dominique Trinquand is a recognized expert in international relations. He has held several positions within NATO, EU or UN. Former head of the French Military Mission to the UN in New York, he took part in several operations in Lebanon, ex-Yugoslavia and Africa. In 2010 he joined Group Marck as Director for

external relations. In 2013, he established OMP Solutions, a group of enterprises equipping contingents participating in peace keeping operations. General Trinquand also advises countries on PK operations and the UN.



Rama Yade

Director of Africa Center, Atlantic Council

Ambassador Rama Yade is director of the Atlantic Council's Africa Center and senior fellow for the Europe Center. She is also a teacher of African affairs at Mohammed VI Polytechnic University in Morocco and, since 2017, at Sciences Po Paris. Prior to joining the Council, she was a consultant for the World Bank. She also has strong experience in the private sector as an editor in London, where she overviewed a collection of books about African millennials, and as director for development at a French consulting firm in corporate and social responsibility. Ambassador Yade has over a decade of experience working in French, European, and international politics. At the age of thirty, she was appointed as the deputy minister for foreign affairs and human rights of the Republic of France. Ambassador Yade prioritized women's rights during the French presidency of the European Union in 2008. In recognition of her work, she was Nelson Mandela's personal guest on his 90th birthday in Johannesburg. She was subsequently appointed to the position of deputy minister of sports. Confirming her commitments towards the fight against discrimination, she led the campaign for all French sports federations to sign a charter against homophobia in sports and to get more involved in equal pay for female athletes. In 2010, Ambassador Yade was appointed as the ambassador of France to UNESCO, where she obtained in 2011, after twelve years of efforts, the designation of World Heritage Site for the French natural sites Causses and Cévennes. Ambassador Yade was also a parliamentary high civil servant in the French Senate and worked in the Luxembourg Palace as legal senior advisor in the law-making process for the Social Affairs Committee (2000-2007). She developed a deep knowledge of worldwide parliamentary networks as the executive director of the France-West Africa Parliamentary Friendship Group. During her service for the French Senate, she cooperated with the TV network of the Parliament, Public Senat, as deputy director for programming and director of communications. In 2006, Ambassador Yade was appointed by the ruling Union pour un mouvement populaire party as a national delegate for the Francophonie. She was also the founder and executive director of the former think tank Allons Enfants and a member of the Young Global Leaders Forum and the French club Le Siècle. Her career is marked by a constant commitment to migration-related diversity and multicultural citizenship in France and everywhere in the world. After serving France, Ambassador Yade's aim is to serve the African continent where she was born. Ambassador Yade received a master's degree in political science and public affairs from Sciences Po Paris. She is the author of several books, including Blacks of France, Human Rights Explained to Children from 7 to 77 years, Letter to the Youth, Advocacy for a Public Instruction, A Chronicle of Power, and Anthology of Sexism in Politics.

Research Fellow, Legon Centre for International Affairs and Diplomacy (LECIAD)

Afua Boatemaa Yakohene is a Research Fellow at the Legon Centre of International Affairs and Diplomacy (LECIAD), University of Ghana, Legon, where she teaches Africa in World Politics, Gender and International Relations and Research Methodology inter alia.
